### What is a town Plan?

A town (or parish) plan sets out a vision for how a community wishes to develop and the actions that are needed to achieve this vision. The plan is usually quite wide in scope in that it takes on board a range of issues within the community.

There is usually a mix of issues raised covering a wider range of topics such as transport, traffic, community facilities, the environment, housing, communication, the local economy, community safety, town appearance etc.

A plan typically comprises a report detailing how consultation has been carried out in the community, conclusions that have been drawn and a detailed plan which the council commits to taking forward.

The core of the Town Plan is the Action Plan, which sets out

- What needs to be done
- When
- By whom

The plan will spread over a number if years. A timetable for periodic reviews and refreshment will be set by the Council.

### How Deal Town Plan was done

### The Initial Meeting

Local organisations and individuals answer three questions about the town and say what they think should be priorities for action. Should Deal have a Town Plan? All support the creation of an inclusive and wide reaching town plan.

### The Household Survey

A leaflet goes to every household and the survey is also available online, circulated via social media, through Town Council contacts and at meetings. The results - a huge list of ideas and actions people want to see.

### From Long List to Short List

The Town Plan Steering Group sorts the ideas and actions into those which require influencing of other bodies and those which can become Town Council actions

### The Prioritisation Survey

A number of residents volunteer to set priorities from the potential actions from the household survey. A list is created of the most important to least important actions, from the most urgent to least urgent.

### **Prioritisation street stall**

More people are asked to set priorities for actions.

### **Councillor input**

Councillors review the prioritised list and add actions they think have been missed. Councillors have their say on priorities and urgency.

### The Town Plan report is created including a detailed Action Plan



A New Deal Plan

Deal Town Council is considering producing a medium-term (3-5 year) plan.

The Council believes that a plan may be very beneficial as it can provide clear targets, better focus, improved use of resources and direction in a rapidly changing world.

### The Initial meeting

To judge if there was support for a Town Plan local organisations and members of public were invited to a meeting, The meeting, held on 29 January 2020. In Deal Town Hall, was independently facilitated by an outside expert experienced in consultation.

Fifty members of the public, including representatives of thirty one community groups and organisations, attended and took part in discussions.

Councillors did not participate, so the views which came out were not influenced by elected members.

### These were the questions posed

1. What are the good things about Deal ?

2. What are the things that are not so good about Deal?

3. What could be done to make Deal an even better place?

And...

4a. Do you agree that a plan is needed to help shape Deal's future?

4b. If yes, what key areas should such a plan cover?

### The Decision

In February 2020 the council decided to take the Deal Town Plan forward.

### Summary of issues brought up at the Initial Meeting

**Facilities**: Whilst there are a wide range of facilities in Deal there are still several issues including a sense of retail dwindling; lack of a large venue and cinema; a tired leisure centre; lack of suitable indoor play facilities; and the embarrassingly poor state of public toilets.

**Transport:** Under investment in highways and public transport is evident with issues including: lack of bus services in town and the surrounding rural communities; inadequate parking facilities; poor roads; poor cycle infrastructure; poor pedestrian signage; minimal traffic management leading to congestion and speeding; deterioration of the station; and insufficient rail services.

**The Next Generation**: Whilst the adults are generally trashing the planet for future generations, in Deal we're also appearing to be failing to provide the next generation with things to do, leading to vandalism across the Town, failing them in secondary school and then failing to provide adequate job opportunities.

**Housing**: The rash of housing development imposed by KCC and central government is felt at this most easterly part of the county with small, medium and even 100+ developments going ahead with inadequate investment in infrastructure and little regard for the needs of local people, young, old or poor. Along with questionable designs, poor quality builds, too many large houses and minimal social housing, this is all felt to be damaging Deal not enhancing it.

**Environment**: People want more trees and more planting to "green the grey". There's also concerns over the general state of Deal's green spaces, along with worries about air pollution, particularly by our congested roads. Separately, there is concern over rubbish and dog mess.

**Tourism**: A lack of hotel accommodation is leading to more unregulated Air B&Bs which is diminishing the housing stock for local people. Despite being a popular place to visit, there's a sense that there's not enough done to promote Deal as a visitor destination. And once here, visitors are unable to fully discover the area due to a distinct lack of signage.

**Social Issues**: Whilst there appears to be a low crime rate, this doesn't tell the whole story as there is a concern about pockets of anti-social behaviour (High St., Station, Seafront, parks etc.) which is linked to a lack of policing and officer visibility.

**Health Service:** There is a concern over the demise of hospital services and the loss of professional NHS staff.

### The Household Survey

Originally the Steering Group had planned an in-person door to door survey where councillors and volunteers knocked on doors in different areas and asked questions. When the pandemic set in and social distancing rules were put in place this plan had to be abandoned.

A paper survey to every household was approved, with the same survey available to complete online. A lot of effort was made to promote the survey on community websites and on physical notice boards, so everybody had a chance to respond to the three questions.

An attractive flyer was created, with Deal Town Council's logo, to make sure it had the best chance of being read and responded to.

The flyer contained the same three questions which were posed at the Initial Meeting. In this way all residents of Deal had the same opportunity to have their views taken into account as the organisations who had attended the event.


10,661 surveys were delivered, one to every address in the town of Deal.


114 paper responses and 433 online responses were received.

This represents 2% of the population.




Making things even better in Deal—what local residents had to say, divided into themes and topics.



















































### Sorting the Long List;

The Steering Group is made up of members from each party on the council. All were careful to take a non-partisan approach through the next stage . It was important that every respondent's view was taken into account and no organisation or group had a louder voice than any other.

Once the Household Survey was analysed the group went through all the comments and suggestions and gathered them into common themes or ideas.

Next councillors discussed what could be done to make the improvements residents wanted to see. A long list of actions was created, which then needed further sorting.

### Lobbying or ACTION?

The long list was split into two parts:

1 Actions that the Town Council could potentially take forward with the resources it has.

2 Actions which were beyond the council's powers or resources.

### Lobbying Issues

Many proposed actions were the direct responsibility of other bodies, such as Kent County Council, Kent Highways or Dover District Council. (see graphic opposite for key responsibilities for KCC and DDC)

Deal Town Council can draw attention to the comments and suggestions from residents and can lobby for change but cannot insist or demand that action be taken.

### The Short List—Deal Town Council Actions

After the actions for other bodies were separated out the Town Council actions were left. This was called the Short List.

The Finance and General Purposes Committee received a report on progress and agreed that the Short List should pass to the next stage—prioritisation.

### The Prioritisation survey

A group of volunteers from the Household Survey were sent a second survey. They were asked to look at the list of Deal Town Council Actions (below) and say which they felt were most important and most urgent on the scales below.

### The Consultation

Deal Town Council carried out an extensive consultation in order to give all residents and local organisations their say on the future of Deal.

Hundreds of people took part and thousands of comments were gathered—as reported in this document.

The process of the consultation and the rationale behind it has been described in this document. Councillors wanted it to be as comprehensive and inclusive as possible.

### **The Completed Action Plan**

The Action Plan has come directly from the results of the consultation, with the addition of a small number of actions from the elected members.

In the transition from the prioritised list (Page 20) to the adopted action plan there have been a few adjustments, mainly for clarity.

- Actions which have already been completed have been noted separately .
- Actions which have been partially completed have been included, with a note that some actions have been done.
- In a few places two very similar actions have been combined.
- Actions which were poorly supported by the survey participants have been removed, unless council had a good reason to keep them in.

### What next?

Once accepted and formally approved by the full council the Action Plan becomes the foundation of Deal Town Council's long term strategic plan. It will be used as a guide to future actions and activities for at least three years.

Any new initiative the council decides to adopt in future years will be added to the Action Plan.


