### Disclosable Pecuniary Interest (DPI)

Where a Member has a new or registered DPI in a matter under consideration they must disclose that they have an interest and, unless the Monitoring Officer has agreed in advance that the DPI is a 'Sensitive Interest', explain the nature of that interest at the meeting. The Member must withdraw from the meeting at the commencement of the consideration of any matter in which they have declared a DPI and must not participate in any discussion of, or vote taken on, the matter unless they have been granted a dispensation permitting them to do so. If during the consideration of any item a Member becomes aware that they have a DPI in the matter they should declare the interest immediately and, subject to any dispensations, withdraw from the meeting.

### Other Significant Interest (OSI)

Where a Member is declaring an OSI they must also disclose the interest and explain the nature of the interest at the meeting. The Member must withdraw from the meeting at the commencement of the consideration of any matter in which they have declared a OSI and must not participate in any discussion of, or vote taken on, the matter unless they have been granted a dispensation to do so or the meeting is one at which members of the public are permitted to speak for the purpose of making representations, answering questions or giving evidence relating to the matter. In the latter case, the Member may only participate on the same basis as a member of the public and cannot participate in any discussion of, or vote taken on, the matter and must withdraw from the meeting in accordance with the Council's procedure rules.

### Voluntary Announcement of Other Interests (VAOI)

Where a Member does not have either a DPI or OSI but is of the opinion that for transparency reasons alone s/he should make an announcement in respect of a matter under consideration, they can make a VAOI. A Member declaring a VAOI may still remain at the meeting and vote on the matter under consideration.

### Note to the Code:

Situations in which a Member may wish to make a VAOI include membership of outside bodies that have made representations on agenda items; where a Member knows a person involved, but does not have a close association with that person; or where an item would affect the well-being of a Member, relative, close associate, employer, etc. but not his/her financial position. It should be emphasised that an effect on the financial position of a Member, relative, close associate, employer, etc OR an application made by a Member, relative, close associate, employer, etc would both probably constitute either an OSI or in some cases a DPI.

Subject: Correspondence received Regarding the Ticket Office at Deal Railway Station

Deal Town Council has received the following correspondence from resident of Deal,

I am copying you in on a letter that I have sent to the local newspaper regarding the closure of the ticket office at Deal Railway Station.

The reason I am doing this is that as our council you should be in the position as the representatives of our town to begin a dialogue with the railways to ensure that we are adequately served by our station and above all that it is safe.

I look forward to your comments about this situation and what your response will be.

Deal Railway Station has been declining for a number of years and sometimes is quite scruffy which in my view is a poor gateway for the large number of visitors we have each year.

Copy of Letter Sent to Local Newspaper:

When I last looked, our beautiful town had a population of around thirty thousand people and with that in mind I find it rather odd that the booking office at Deal Railway Station is quite frequently closed for business.

It is bad enough that stations such as Sandwich, Walmer and Martins Mill are closed for business much of the time but for Deal to follow suit is a poor show.

When I enquired about the reason(s) I was told that it was due to Covid and staff shortages which I did not believe for one minute as I have chatted to other members of staff who have noted that it is nothing but a cost cutting measure.

One does have to think hard about the days when once thriving railway stations were either closed or downgraded to such an extent that they were little more than glorified halts.

This I believe is the hidden agenda at present as to staff railway stations costs money and obviously this obviously eats into the profits.

I am often told to use the ticket machines which are okay for simple journeys but if your chosen journey is complicated by a card then this normally confuses the machine and it often tries to charge the full single or return fare.

Add to this the sometimes aggressive attitude of Revenue Protection Officers on the trains then this is a recipe for disaster. Although this has not happened to me, I have as a frequent traveller seen perfectly innocent travellers subjected to somewhat intimidating situations because they have been unable to purchase the ticket of their choice through no fault of their own.

I realise that there are those who choose not to pay their fares but this Stasi type of approach does not do anyone any favours.

What is more alarming is that unmanned stations are unsafe (no matter what the railways tell us) and it is the responsibility of the railways to ensure that they have adequately trained staff at ALL stations without exception.

Without looking back to the golden years of the railways it was not so long ago that railway stations were properly manned and one could purchase a ticket to anywhere in the country without a problem.

Passengers were treated like customers and not an inconvenience as happens today.

If we are not careful we might in future years find that we will have lost the passenger facilities at Deal Railway Station completely.

I would welcome the views of other readers and have made my views known to the Deal Town Council.

Monday - Saturday: 5.45 - 19.10

Sunday: 7.30 - 16.00

They did however state that due to Covid, other sickness and staff shortages that these times were not always adhered to.

### **TTRO**

At the January Transport & Infrastructure Committee Meeting Members resolved "To agree the budget as detailed and to delegate authority to the Town Clerk in liaison with the R.F.O, Project Officer, and Chairman of this committee to authorise expenditure within the agreed budget in order that the Officers work can continue on the permanent TRO. The Chairman to write a letter to KCC Highways to request an extension of the TRO whilst negotiations are taking place.

I am pleased to report that the letter to KCC highways has resulted in an extension to the maximum period allowed under the Temporary Traffic Regulation Order (TTRO). This extension allows the temporary closures to continue until September 2022 and should give plenty of time for the permanent Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) application to go through.

The only problem will be the funding for closures beyond 31st March when the Welcome Back fund closes. The cost of these closures to the council will be £250 per week.

### **Pedestrianisation Survey**

The Pedestrianisation survey to support the permanent TRO application has been running for a number of weeks and closes on 15<sup>th</sup> March when the results can be included in the formal application to KCC.

At the time of writing this report, 556 responses have been received of which over 90% are in favour of making the closure between Stanhope Road and Union Road on Saturdays between 10am and 2pm a permanent feature.

### Recommendation

Members to consider if whilst the TRO application is being prepared and processed by KCC, that the temporary closures of the High Street between Stanhope Road and Union Road on Saturdays between 10am and 2pm should continue beyond 31st March and be funded from the T&I budget.

All the crossings on all the routes through the three wards have been surveyed and scored with the results compiled into a comprehensive report.


